


### PARENTS AND TEACHERS REALLY DIG OUR CHILDREN'S BOOKS TOO... HERE'S WHY!







What is it about Doug the Digger books that captures the imagination of so many New Zealand Children, while at the same time getting a big tick of approval from parents and teachers?

"You can guess the sort of child I was at school, can't you?" Mr Mac laughs. "I'd rather be outside with a bucket and spade building roads and making hills in sandpits than reading books or writing stories back then, that's for sure!"

When Mr Mac Visits schools with his Doug the Digger Roadshow, he sees heaps of kids with that same attitude. "The trouble is," he continues, "you get to a point in your life when you realise how important those reading and writing skills are if you want to be able to reach your potential and fulfill your future goals."

"With Doug the Digger, I wanted to create a character that kids like this can relate to. Sure, he loves digging trenches, pushing around dirt and dumping metal, but he also learns in the stories that he needs to listen Carefully, follow instructions and work hard in a team environment to get the day's work done."

For classroom teachers, there's plenty in the books that can be used to reinforce the Key Competencies as outlined in the NZ curriculum. "These books are all about the importance of thinking, self-management, relating to others and participating and contributing towards a shared goal." Mr Mac explains.

Mr Mac and his team are currently in the process of creating a resource pack for schools that teachers can incorporate into their shared book programme. "It will include activity sheets,

text features to highlight, as well as suggestions for linking back to the Key Competencies and other areas of the New Zealand Curriculum." Enlarged A3 size versions of each book are already available to order online.

Standard (A4 size) books both come complete with audio CD.

### RUSSELL BIRDILLIN RETURNS!


