

TURNING YOUR DREAMS INTO REALITY...

HOW 'DOUG THE DIGGER' & WAS BORN...

Having a good idea is one thing, but turning your dreams into reality takes planning, teamwork, a positive attitude and plenty of hard work!

"I remember like it was yesterday, that day when the idea for Doug the Digger first came to me," Mr Mac explains.

"On 15 november, 1997 I grabbed a piece of paper and had a go at drawing him... though I knew straight away when I looked at my sketch that I was going to need some help!" he laughs.

Help Came first from Kylie Leveridge, a friend of Mr Mac's who he knew was handy when it came to drawing. "The sketch Kylie did for me really began to bring Doug the Digger to life... from that moment on I knew this was an idea worth developing," he recalls.

In March 1998, Mr Mac met Whangarei graphic artist/illustrator Bevan Fidler, who was commissioned to further develop the Character to a point where a book about Doug the Digger could be made. "Bevan knew nothing about diggers, so the first job was to bring him down to a construction site where he could get busy taking reference photos." While the look of Doug the Digger was being developed, Mr Mac decided it was time to have a go at writing the story.

"I knew what I wanted... a story about a day in Doug the Digger's life, where he works hard, meets challenges and learns important lessons along the way... but getting the story down on paper was way harder than I thought it would be!"

Look at all the steps we had to take to achieve our goal!

- A good idea to Create a Character called 'Doug the Digger'
- Developing the character with the help of Kylie and Bevan (pictures)
- Working out the words and storyline (Mr Mac and Jack)
- Creating a draft book (Total Idea Company)
- Creating sketches for the 12 pages deciding as a team what needs to be drawn on each of the pages
- Meetings...
- Recording sounds and creating music for the CD (Jack)
- Creating full colour artworks for each of the 12 pages (Bevan)
- More meetings!
- Scanning artworks, arranging text and creating 'proof' of book to check (Calders Design & Print)
- Copying of music and narration onto hundreds of CD's (Stebbings Studio)
- Publishing of book The need for good teeth" (November 2000)


So Mr Mac called on the services of Jack Lloyd Jones, a local recording musician with a real gift for writing catchy lyrics. "Jack's skills were the missing piece of the puzzle," says Mr Mac, "as a songwriter he knows how to make words really work." An added bonus was that Jack had a state-of-the-art recording studio at his home, so an audio CD to go with the book became an obvious addition on the working group's 'to-do' list.

Once the text for the story was finalised, Bevan got to work creating rough sketches for artworks to go alongside the writing on each page. At this time, the team decided to call in the services of John Kearney from Total Idea Company in Whangarei to create a draft (prototype) of the book, using the text and Bevan's sketches. "This really gave us an idea of where we were heading," says Mr Mac.

After some minor changes were made to the sketches and everyone was happy, Bevan began creating the 12 original pastel artworks to be used in the book. Jack also got busy recording sounds (such as diggers starting up, moreporks hooting and dogs barking) to be used on the music CD that he was creating for the book.

A few months later, with the pictures all finished, it was time for Calders Design and Print in Whangarei to get the book ready for printing. They scanned all of the artworks, arranged the writing into separate typed-up pages, and printed out a 'proof' copy for Mr Mac and the rest of the team to check. The fabulous CD that Jack had recorded was copied onto hundreds of discs by Stebbings Recording Studio in Auckland.

And the rest, as they say, is history. The first Doug the Digger book, "The need for good teeth", was finally published in November, 2000. The team followed this up with the second book, "The need for listening" in 2003.


RHYS MCINTYRE MEMORIAL TROPHY WINNER


